GUIDANCE ON MARITIME CLAIMS

(In continuation to the article of 1st October, Issue)

POLLUTION CLAIMS

1.4.1.1.1.2 Channelling

The channelling provisions debar claimants from bringing claims for "oil pollution damage" within the meaning of the convention against parties other than the registered owner and thereby minimise the complications which can arise were claims to be brought against multiple defendants. Therefore, claims for "oil pollution damage" cannot be brought against other possible targets such as the servants and agents of the shipowner or the crew, pilot, charterers, managers, operators and salvors of the vessel unless it is proved that the damage resulted from their personal act or omission committed with intent to cause such damage, or recklessly and with knowledge that such damage would probably result.

Such channelling provisions also assist in the provision of compulsory liability insurance since all available liability insurance resources can be concentrated and thereby provide higher levels of cover than those which could otherwise be provided if such resources were to be dissipated between various defendants.

However, the 'channelling' system can be avoided even in countries that have adopted the CLC regime. For example, in the case of the ERIKA, the European Court of Justice (ECJ) considered whether various parties were liable for the costs incurred in the cleaning-up and disposal of substantial quantities of oil which had been lost from the ERIKA and which had been deposited on the shoreline mixed with water and sediment. The court held that such a mixture constituted 'waste' for the purposes of a EU Directive which imposed strict liability on waste producers and holders for the cost of waste disposal and management if their conduct had contributed to the risk of pollution. The court seems to have recognised that although the 'channelling' provisions of the CLC 1992 enabled Total as charterer to avoid liability for "pollution damage" as defined in the CLC Conventions, a charterer could still be held liable as a 'producer' or 'holder' of the 'waste' under the EU Directive. Consequently, Total was obliged to collect, recover and dispose of the oily mixture.

1.4.1.1.3 Claims for 'Oil Pollution Damage

CLC 1969 applies only to 'oil pollution damage' that has been caused in the territorial waters of states that have accepted that convention, but pollution damage is extended under CLC 1992 to the exclusive economic zone (EEZ) of a contracting state, which normally extends to 200 nautical miles from the baselines from which the territorial sea is measured.

Claims will be subject to the CLC regime only if they are for 'oil pollution damage' as defined in the CLC Conventions. If they are not claims which fall within that definition then the CLC regime does not apply and liability will be determined in accordance with the provisions of other conventions or the provisions of local law in the country where the pollution occurred.

In the majority of cases, claims will be allowed for:

- Costs and expenses incurred in order to prevent pollution damage following a spill, or to clean up and restore polluted areas and property;
- Loss or damage caused by physical contamination of property, e.g. the soiling of recreational boats or fishing nets, or the clogging of water intakes to a production facility, or economic losses incurred as a result of such events regardless of whether or not the claimants have been directly affected by contamination, e.g. fishery and tourism losses, as well as damage or losses caused by clean-up and restoration activities:
- Costs and expenses incurred in restoring damaged natural resources that have no direct economic value, e.g. beaches, mangroves, marshlands, coral reefs and their wildlife flora and fauna habitats. Even if such restoration cannot be carried out, claims

for losses which can be shown to have arisen as a direct result of the incident may be allowed.

However, although CLC 1992 has expanded the scope of qualifying claims, there may still be 'grey areas' where it is uncertain whether or not a particular claim will be covered. The CLC and Fund Conventions do not themselves specify whether claims will or will not be qualifying claims but the IOPC Fund has published a Claims Manual which gives guidance as to the types of claims which are likely to be accepted or rejected and these guidelines will normally be the determining factor. The IOPC Fund also publishes a periodic report itemising Incidents Involving IOPC Funds.

1.4.1.1.1.4 Strict Liability

Under the CLC regime claimants do not need to produce evidence to show how the incident happened, or to prove fault on the shipowner's part. The mere occurrence of "oil pollution damage caused by oil which has escaped or been discharged from the ship as a result of an incident" is sufficient to establish liability unless the shipowner is able to prove that the damage was:

- . The result of an act of war, hostilities, civil war or insurrection; or
- The result of a natural phenomenon of an exceptional, inevitable or irresistible character; or
- Was wholly caused by an act or omission done with intent to cause damage by a third party; or
- Was wholly caused by the negligence or other wrongful act of any government or other authority responsible for the maintenance of lights or other navigational aids in the exercise of that function.

1.4.1.1.5 Limitation of Liability

The CLC regime provides that the liability of the shipowner is to be capped at the maximum compensation applicable under the various conventions. This can be seen as a measure to counter-balance the virtual strict liability which an owner is likely to face. However, the right of the shipowner to limit his liability in this way may be lost if he is guilty of certain conduct. The nature of the conduct that is necessary to debar the right to limit is different under the two conventions. Under CLC 1969 the right to limit is lost if the incident has been caused by fault and privity on the part of the shipowning company. Therefore, in certain cases, the right to limit could be lost if there were to be personal negligence on the part of the alter ego (i.e. the higher management) of the shipowning company itself (but not, for example, on the part of the master, unless the master was also the owner.) However, under CLC 1992, the right of a shipowner to limit liability will be lost only if it is proved "that the pollution damage resulted from his personal act or omission, committed with intent to cause such damage, or recklessly and with knowledge that such damage would probably result." This is a more difficult test for a claimant to overcome and should in normal circumstances be virtually unbreakable.

In both cases, the relevant conduct must be that of the alter ego of the shipowning company. Therefore, in the majority of cases, it is the conduct of the higher management of the shipowning company which will be relevant. However, it has seldom been necessary in practice for claimants to challenge the shipowner's right of limitation under CLC since even if claims exceed CLC limits, the additional compensation available under the Fund Conventions has normally been sufficient to satisfy such claims in full.





SHIPPING NEWS

VULNERABILITY OF SUPPLY CHAINS EXPOSED AS GLOBAL MARITIME CHOKEPOINTS COME UNDER PRESSURE

he global economy, food security, and energy supplies are at increasing risk due to vulnerabilities at key maritime routes. The Review of Maritime Transport 2024 from UN Trade and Development (UNCTAD) reveals that critical chokepoints such as the Panama Canal (connecting the Pacific and Atlantic Oceans), the Red Sea and the Suez Canal (linking the Mediterranean Sea to the Indian Ocean via the Arabian Peninsula), and the Black Sea (an important hub for grain exports) are under severe strain. A combination of geopolitical tensions, climate impacts, and conflicts have shaken global trade, threatening the functioning of maritime supply chains.

Maritime trade, which grew by 2.4% in 2023 to reach 12,292 million tons, began to recover after a contraction in 2022. However, the future remains uncertain. The report projects a modest 2% growth for 2024, driven by demand for bulk commodities like iron ore, coal, and grain, alongside containerized goods. Yet, these figures mask deeper challenges. Container trade, which grew by just 0.3% in 2023, is expected to rebound by 3.5% in 2024, but long-term growth will depend on how the industry adapts to ongoing disruptions, such as the war in Ukraine and rising geopolitical tensions in the Middle East. Meanwhile, the supply of container ship capacity grew by 8.2% in 2023. Disruptions at key maritime chokepoints, which temporarily increased demand for ships by lengthening shipping routes, have helped ease the issue of overcapacity. However, if shipping routes return to normal, the imbalance between supply and demand could lead to container vessel overcapacity.

Disruptions at major maritime chokepoints

Key shipping routes have faced significant disruptions, causing delays, rerouting, and higher costs. Traffic through the Panama and Suez Canals — critical arteries of global trade — dropped by over 50% by mid-2024, compared to their peaks. This decline was driven by climate-induced low water levels in the Panama Canal and the outbreak of conflict in the Red Sea region affecting the Suez Canal. Meanwhile, the tonnage of ships transiting through the Gulf of Aden and the Suez Canal fell by 76% and 70% respectively, compared to late 2023.

Cargo rerouting around the Cape of Good Hope (southern tip of Africa) has surged, with ship capacity arrivals increasing by 89%. While this helps maintain the flow of goods, it adds significantly to costs, delays and carbon emissions. For example, a typical large container ship carrying 20,000–24,000 Twenty-Foot Equivalent Units (TEUs) on the Far East-Europe route incurs an additional \$400,000 in emissions costs per voyage under the European

Union's Emissions Trading System (ETS) when diverting around Africa instead of using the Suez Canal.

Longer routes, higher costs

These longer routes have led to increased port congestion, higher fuel consumption, crew wages, insurance premiums, and exposure to piracy. Global ton-miles rose by 4.2% in 2023, driving up costs and emissions. By mid-2024, rerouting vessels away from the Red Sea and Panama Canal had increased global vessel demand by 3% and container ship demand by 12%, compared to what it would have been without these disruptions. This added significant pressure to global logistics and strained supply chains.

Port hubs like Singapore and major Mediterranean ports are now under pressure, as they cope with growing demand for transshipment services due to the rerouting of vessels. Congestion in these ports is adding another layer of complexity for global transport and trading networks.

Small island states and vulnerable economies hit hardest

The disruptions and rising costs are not affecting all countries equally. Small Island Developing States (SIDS) and Least Developed Countries (LDCs) are experiencing the worst impacts. An analysis suggests that if the rise in container freight rates observed between October 2023 and June 2024 and caused by the disruptions in the Red Sea and Panama Canal continues until the end of 2025, global consumer prices could rise by 0.6% by the end of 2025. For SIDS, the potential impact is even more severe, with prices increasing by 0.9%, and processed food prices possibly rising by 1.3%.

SIDS economies rely heavily on shipping for essential imports, but their maritime connectivity has declined by 9% on average over the past decade, making their isolation more pronounced. Today, on average, SIDS are ten times less connected to global shipping networks compared to non-SIDS countries.

Adapting to climate change and building resilience to wideranging disruptions

The report highlights the urgent need for the maritime industry to build resilience against the growing impacts of climate change and other disruptions. Extreme weather events are disrupting port and shipping operations more frequently, posing safety risks, delaying operations and transit times and driving up costs. These disruptions also have legal implications, as companies must now factor climate risks into shipping contracts – to minimize losses and legal disputes, keep trade flowing and insurance affordable.



Building resilience across maritime chokepoints, transport and logistics in the face of multiple disruptions requires a comprehensive sector-wide approach. This includes capacity building and investments in infrastructure, services, workforce development, technology, partnerships and collaborative initiatives.

Accelerating the shift to low-carbon shipping

With global emissions continuing to rise and the International Maritime Organization (IMO) adopting more ambitious greenhouse gas emission targets in 2023, the need for rapid decarbonization is critical. However, progress remains slow as the transition to greener ships and low carbon fuels is still in its early stages. Fleet renewal has been hampered by uncertainty over future fuels and technology. By early 2024, only 50% of new ship capacity orders were for vessels capable of using alternative fuels. Meanwhile, scrapping older ships has slowed due to the high freight rates and increased demand for vessels following the rise in shipping distances.

Addressing fraudulent ship registration

Another pressing issue is the rise of fraudulent ship registrations

and registries, undermining safety, security, pollution control, and seafarer welfare. This is compounded by a growing "dark fleet" of ships that operates under the radar, bypassing international regulations. UNCTAD calls on United Nations Member States and industry stakeholders to actively support IMO work to combat these fraudulent practices.

Key recommendations

As the maritime industry faces growing challenges, UNCTAD's report urges coordinated efforts to navigate, adapt and thrive in this complex environment. It calls for addressing disruptions at maritime chokepoints, investing in low carbon and green shipping, enhancing port efficiency and adaptation, mainstreaming trade facilitation to improve hinterland connectivity and combating fraudulent ship registration. Additionally, the report emphasizes the importance of monitoring freight market developments, assessing trends in shipping rates and their impacts supporting vulnerable economies. By taking these steps, countries and their maritime industries can build a more resilient and sustainable future.

On October 7, 2024, the FSMA ordered CMB, in light of the Market Court ruling of September 6, 2024, to reopen its mandatory public takeover bid on all shares in CMB.TECH that expired on March 15, 2024 (the "Bid") on the basis of a supplement to the prospectus dated February 13, 2024 (together with the New U.S. Offer, the "Reopening"). The FSMA approved such supplement on October 22, 2024.

The acceptance period of the Reopening opens on October 23, 2024 and closes on November 21, 2024 at 4 p.m. (Belgian time) (10 a.m. New York City time) (the "Acceptance Period of the Reopening"). Shareholders are not obliged to participate in the Reopening. During the acceptance period, shareholders may choose to either tender, or to not tender, their shares to the Bidder.

The bid price of the Reopening amounts to USD 12.66 per share (the "Bid Price"), to be reduced on a dollar-for-dollar basis by the gross amount of any distributions by CMB.TECH to its shareholders with a payment date falling before the settlement date of the reopening. The Bidder notes that on October 21, 2024, the most recent trading day before the approval of the supplement by the FSMA, the closing price of the Target's shares on the New York Stock Exchange (the "NYSE") was USD 16.21 and therefore exceeds the Bid Price of USD 12.66 per share. The Bid Price consequently represents a discount of USD 3.55 (i.e. approximately 21.90%) as compared to the closing price of the Target's share on the NYSE. Shareholders should therefore take into account that the Bid Price of the reopened Bid may be lower than the price against which shareholders can sell their shares on Euronext Brussels or the NYSE.

In a supplement to its response memorandum, CMB.TECH's supervisory board unanimously recommends that shareholders do not tender their shares in the reopening.

The reopened Bid is made in accordance with applicable Belgian law and is addressed to all shareholders regardless of their location. Concurrently with the reopened Bid, CMB is making a new U.S. offer in accordance with applicable U.S. federal securities laws (the "New U.S. Offer"), addressed to U.S. shareholders within the meaning of Rule 14d-1(d) under the Securities Exchange Act of 1934, as amended ("U.S. Holders").

Shareholders holding U.S. shares (i.e. shares formatted for trading on the NYSE and reflected on the U.S. component of CMB.TECH's share register) who wish to tender their shares into the reopened Bid are required to first reposition such U.S. shares to Belgian shares (i.e. shares formatted for trading on Euronext Brussels and reflected on the Belgian component of CMB.TECH's share register) and are therefore urged to contact their financial intermediary or custodian to ensure that such repositioning takes place prior to the closing of the Acceptance Period of the Reopening

UNDERSTANDING EU ETS: AN INTRODUCTION

Luropean Union Emissions Trading System aka EU ETS is one of the main tools through which the EU aims at combating climate change and reduce the greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions. EU ETS was first launched in 2005. It is the oldest emissions trading scheme in the world. The EU ETS covers 10,000 industrial plants, and power stations, including 390 aircraft operators across 27 member states, Iceland, Norway, and Liechtenstein.



Also known as the EU Climate policy, the EU ETS is a regulatory market – meaning that it has been created by policy makers as opposed just being a result of market forces. The stated aim of the EU's Emissions Trading System is to facilitate cost-effective decarbonization across key sectors of the EU economy.

The main principle of the ETS; cost of pollution should be borne by those who create it.

THE JOURNEY SO FAR

The initial idea was to keep GHG emissions in control by levying a carbon tax. In 1992, a combined carbon and energy tax proposal was put forward but in vain. It could not gather the unanimous agreement of all the European Union member states (12 members at the time), and the entire carbon tax approach for aborted for good with a shift towards capping and trade emissions.

The EU ETS was conceived and accepted in 2005 and since then, has had many revisions; the latest one being that of 2021. It has the following key features:

- An ambitious target of 62% emissions reduction within EU ETS by 2030.
- ◆ The Carbon Border Adjustment Mechanism was introduced to help phase out free allowances from 2026 to 2034.

◆ The Maritime sector was included in EU ETS on grounds that it contributed 3-4% of EU's total emissions at over 124 metric tonnes of CO₂ emissions in 2021.

A CAP-AND-TRADE SYSTEM

The EU ETS mode of functioning is the primarily put a cap on the overall GHGs produced in the territory covered by it. For the marine industry this means 100% of shipping within the European Union and 50% of voyages to EU ports from third countries. The EU ETS plans to gradually lower the cap, that's how it will achieve reduction targets.

The cap is divided into pollution permits known as EU Allowances (EUAs)

1 EUA = 1 tonne of CO2 eq emississions


If a company emitted 1 million tonnes of CO_2 in 2023, they would need to transfer 1 million EUAs to the European Commission's Central Registry in 2024. To simplify, the EU ETS wants you to know that the act of polluting the environment is a privilege you will have to buy in the form of European Union Allowances EUAs. It's called an allowance stressing on the fact that it is an 'allowance' granted to organizations while we run the risk of uncontrolled climate catastrophe.

The EUAs can be acquired in three ways:

- They can be bought at auctions.
- They can be given for free by the EU to certain countries or industries
- ◆ They can be bought from other market players who have unutilized EUAs and can spare it in exchange of real money. (If a company has reduced its CO₂ eq emissions more than expected, it can either sell its EUAs or keep them safe for the future.)

The important thing to note is that this system works only when there is a limited supply of EUAs and since the EUAs are issued by the EU ETS, only as many EUAs will be made available as is the cap for that year. It is expected thus that the EUAs will become exceedingly costly and spaced over time.

The cost of acquiring EUAs now and in the future is the financial incentive to reduce emissions — so either you continue to pay for high and continued emissions, or invest in technology that will help in reducing emissions. On the other hand, subsidies for utilization of renewable sources of energy to be used as maritime fuel will further incentivize greener maritime trade.

Carbon Border Adjustment Mechanism (CBAM) in the Maritime Industry

The Carbon Border Adjustment Mechanism (CBAM) is a crucial component of the European Union's climate strategy, specifically designed to address carbon leakage and promote environmental sustainability within the maritime sector. As part of the broader reforms to the EU Emissions Trading System (EU ETS), CBAM seeks to ensure a level playing field between EU shipping companies that adhere to stringent carbon regulations and foreign operators that may not comply with the same environmental standards.

At its essence, CBAM introduces a tariff on certain maritime imports from countries that fall short of the EU's climate criteria. This approach is vital in preventing carbon leakage, where shipping lines might relocate their operations to regions with lower carbon costs, ultimately jeopardizing the EU's climate objectives. By imposing a financial burden on carbon-intensive imports, CBAM incentivizes trading partners in the maritime industry to adopt more sustainable practices, thereby promoting global climate action.



The implementation of CBAM will be phased in gradually, initially targeting high-emission sectors, including those heavily reliant on shipping, such as cement, steel, and electricity. As these industries are among the top contributors to greenhouse gas emissions, they present a significant opportunity for emissions reductions. Importers in the maritime trade will need to acquire CBAM certificates, which reflect the carbon price that would have been incurred had the goods been produced under EU regulations.

Furthermore, CBAM encourages innovation and investment in cleaner maritime technologies, as shipping companies adapt to meet both EU standards and consumer expectations. This mechanism not only reinforces the EU's commitment to achieving climate neutrality by 2050 but also motivates other nations to adopt similar measures, creating a widespread awareness of climate responsibilities in international shipping.

ENSURING COMPLIANCE

The companies need to ensure compliance on three counts:

- Accurate measurement of emissions. This includes the amount of fuel consumed and corresponding CO2 emissions.
- ▶ Accurate reporting of emissions. Independent verifiers assess the reported data to ensure accuracy. Only verified reports are accepted, which helps maintain accountability.
- ▶ Make sure they match the required number of EUAs.

Compliance needs reinforcement and the ETS has plans for that:

The EU ETS includes strict measures to address misreporting and non-compliance. Shipping companies that fall under this system are required to accurately monitor and report their emissions. Failure to meet these obligations can lead to significant financial penalties. Specifically, organizations that do not comply or are found to have misreported emissions face fines of €100 per ton of emissions, in addition to the costs associated with purchasing EU Allowances (EUAs). This punitive approach underscores the seriousness of accurate reporting in achieving climate goals.

The EU ETS also employs a transparent monitoring and verification process, ensuring that emissions data is subject to scrutiny by independent verifiers. This transparency is designed to foster accountability and deter fraudulent practices within the maritime sector. Companies found guilty of misreporting can face additional sanctions, which may include reputational damage and increased regulatory oversight.

Moreover, the system encourages a culture of compliance by rewarding those who adhere to regulations through potential financial benefits associated with emissions reductions. As the EU aims for significant emissions reductions by 2030, the enforcement of these penalties serves not only to reprimand non-compliance but also to promote a shift toward more sustainable practices in the maritime industry. This comprehensive approach ultimately supports the EU's broader climate objectives, driving all participants to align with the commitment to environmental sustainability.

Ultimately, the success of the EU ETS will not only contribute to the EU's climate goals but also serve as a model for other regions aiming to implement effective emissions trading systems, reinforcing the global commitment to a greener future. THIS HANDHELD SENSORY DEVICE IS HELPING BLIND SPORTS FANS 'FEEL' THE GAME



Por visually impaired sports fans at stadiums around the world, following a match often means relying on commentators or those around them to describe the action. Now, an Irish startup is looking to create a more level playing field. Dublin-based Field of Vision has produced a handheld, haptic feedback device that it says can help blind and partially sighted fans not just hear, but "feel" the action, enhancing the live experience.

Custom-built cameras positioned in each corner of the stadium use artificial intelligence (AI) to track key details from a match. Within roughly half a second, this information is transmitted to a white, tablet-sized device embossed with the shape of a sports pitch, which weighs under a kilogram and rests on the user's lap.

A small magnetic ring guides the user's finger around the tablet – not unlike the movement on a Ouija board – based on where the ball is, and vibrates to convey various match events, such as a tackle or a change in possession.

The device is designed to enhance audio-descriptive commentary as opposed to replacing it entirely, with a built-in headphone jack allowing users to access audio commentary if the stadium provides a feed.

"The main feedback we've gotten (about the device) has been that it actually makes them feel like they're part of the game and they're experiencing it with everyone else," Field of Vision co-founder David Deneher told CNN.

"Game changer"

Deneher launched the business alongside two friends – fellow Trinity College Dublin student Tim Farrelly, and Queen's University Belfast student Omar Salem – in 2020, as they looked for something to fill their time during the Covid-19 lockdown.

Aerospace engineering graduate Salem first envisioned the idea after seeing social media footage of partially sighted Liverpool supporter Mike Kearny. On the terraces of the English Premier League giant's Anfield stadium, Kearny's cousin Stephen Garcia stood next to him and talked him through the action.

With 320,000 people registered blind or partially sighted in the UK alone, according to the Royal National Institute of Blind People (RNIB), and an estimated 43 million blind people worldwide, Field of Vision's technology could potentially improve the live sports experience for a swathe of fans.

Declan Meenagh, a supporter of Dublin football club Bohemians, was born with a genetic eye condition that limits him to 5% vision. Meenagh cannot see beyond the crossbar even if sat in the front row behind the goal at the team's Dalymount Park stadium.Club volunteers who describe matches for visually impaired spectators allow him to follow along via an earphone, but he can miss key lines when the crowd gets loud.

He said that a test run with the Field Of Vision tablet added new levels of context to proceedings on the pitch. "Actually feeling where the football is and what's going on is just a real game changer," he told CNN.

"It helps out a lot because you have a two-dimensional

understanding of where it (the ball) is on the pitch and how it moves, and you actually feel things move really quickly - it's really good."

Kick off

Field of Vision was a runner-up for the James Dyson award – an international student design prize – in 2021, and included on Time's list of best inventions for 2022. This June, it won Best Initiative to Promote Inclusivity and Physical Activity at the Irish Sport Industry Awards. The company has raised roughly €250,000 in funding, most of which has come from business accelerator programs, with grants and prize money won from various competitions also injecting cash.

The founders were mentored by sports industry executive Tom Sears, and after the technology had been tested at Bohemian, whose ground has a capacity of under 5,000 spectators, he last year helped arrange early prototype testing at Manchester City's Etihad Stadium, which can seat more than 50,000 fans. As part of a trial, the device was used by three season ticket holders across seven of the club's home matches.

It served as the ideal preparation for a full rollout at the roughly 53,000-seater Marvel Stadium, in Melbourne, Australia, which is home to five Australian Rules Football teams – a completely different sport to soccer.

After the 2024 season ended in September, cameras were installed at the stadium and the AI retrained to record match details on the oval shaped pitch. Marvel Stadium will offer 40 devices at every game played there during next year's Australian Football League (AFL) season.

The capacity of the device to be reprogrammed for a sport wildly different from soccer hints at a future for the business that could expand far beyond the soccer field. "Long-term we want to expand to all the major sports in the world and to have it so that this is just a standard for stadiums and live venues to have within their infrastructure," said Deneher.

Field of Vision is currently in the process of selling the product to football teams across Europe's top five leagues (England, Spain, France, Germany and Italy), and Deneher said that "immediate plans" are also in place to start selling to US markets and expand further in the AFL.

Clubs would pay a yearly subscription for the AI model, cameras and match delivery service and another to annually lease the tablets. A subscription-based model was chosen over selling the system outright to account for the likely fluctuating number of visually impaired fans each season, as well as to allow devices to be swapped out for potential repairs, Deneher explained.

Prices are still being finalized but will be dependent on the respective demands and stadium sizes of each club. He added that while the technology might be perceived as a luxury at the moment, it could one day become as commonplace as wheelchair ramps.

"We just want football and live sports to be more accessible for everyone," Deneher said. "So the plan is to expand to more stadiums, more countries, and more sports for the future."

INDIA AND CHINA HAVE STRUCK A DEAL THAT COULD EASE BORDER TENSIONS AHEAD OF EXPECTED LEADER MEETING

India and China have reached an agreement on military disengagement along their disputed border, New Delhi said, a step toward reducing frictions between the nuclear-armed neighbors that comes ahead of an expected meeting between the countries' leaders on the sidelines of a summit in Russia.

India's foreign minister Subrahmanyam Jaishankar said the agreement on military patrolling in certain areas brought the situation back to where it was in 2020 prior to a deadly border clash that year, thus completing the "disengagement process" with China.

Beijing later confirmed that the two sides had "reached a solution" following "close communication on relevant issues of the China-India border through diplomatic and military channels."

The announcement has been widely seen as setting the stage for talks between Chinese leader Xi Jinping and Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi, who are attending a three-day summit of BRICS nations in southwestern Russia's Kazan.

India's Ministry of External Affairs confirmed the leaders would meet. The sit-down is expected to be Xi and Modi's first formal talks since before the 2020 clash, which has left a lasting strain on the countries' relationship. Beijing has yet to confirm the meeting.

Both India and China maintain a significant military presence along their 2,100-mile (3,379-kilometer) de facto border, known as the Line of Actual Control (LAC), which has never been clearly defined and has remained a source of friction since a bloody war between the two countries in 1962.

The clash four years ago along the disputed border between Indian Ladakh and Chinese-controlled Aksai Chin brought the first known fatalities in more than four decades – with at least 20 Indian and four Chinese soldiers killed.

In a rare, informal meeting at last year's BRICS summit in Johannesburg, Xi and Modi agreed to "intensify efforts" to

deescalate tensions at the contested border. Chinese and Indian negotiators held the 31st round of border talks in late August.

While an agreement on further disengagement on the border appears poised to be a significant step in what has been a sore point among other frictions in the China-India relationship, observers said more details were needed to understand the scope of the arrangement and what concessions may have been made.

'A positive development'

Speaking about the new agreement at an event hosted by Indian broadcaster NDTV, India's Minister of External Affairs described how after the 2020 clash the two sides had "blocked" each other in certain areas

"What has happened is, we have reached an understanding which will allow the patrolling ... the understanding, to my knowledge, is that we will be able to do the patrolling which we were doing in 2020," Jaishankar said.

"It is a positive development. I would say it is a product of a very patient and very persevering diplomacy," he said, adding that the consequences of the agreement on the two nations' relationship has yet to be seen.

Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesperson Lin Jian said Beijing "positively evaluates" the "solution" reached and would "work with India to implement the above solution," without providing further details. Lin's comments were made during a regularly scheduled media briefing.

Manoj Kewalramani, who heads Indo-Pacific studies at the Takshashila Institution Research Center in the Indian city of Bangalore, said a restoration of patrolling rights would be a "significant starting point" for normalization.

"There are many other issues of de-induction and de-mobilization of troops on both sides; infrastructure that has been built, etc. These issues will take time," he said.

PM MODI MEETS GERMANY'S SCHOLZ, SAYS 'WAR CANNOT SOLVE PROBLEMS' ON WEST ASIA, UKRAINE CONFLICTS

Prime Minister Narendra Modi reiterated India's commitment to resolve the ongoing Ukraine-Russia conflict

"The ongoing conflicts in Ukraine and West Asia are a matter of concern for both of us. India has always believed that problems cannot be solved by war and India is ready to make every possible contribution for the restoration of peace," the prime minister said after meeting German chancellor Olaf Scholz in New Delhi.

"The growing cooperation in the defence and security sectors is a symbol of our deep mutual trust. The agreement on the exchange of classified information is a new step in this direction. The Mutual Legal, Assistant Treaty concluded will strengthen our joint efforts to deal with terrorism and separatist elements," the prime minister added.

Scholz is leading a high-level delegation to New Delhi, betting that greater access to the vast Indian market can reduce Germany's reliance on China.

Earlier, the German chancellor also pitched for political solutions based on international laws to deal with global conflicts.

Addressing the 18th Asia-Pacific Conference of German Business 2024 in the capital, Scholz said, "In the multi-polar world, there are no global policemen, no single watchdog monitoring our common rules. If Russia were to succeed with its illegal brutal war against Ukraine, there would be repercussions far beyond Europe's borders. Such an outcome would endanger global security and prosperity as a whole."

What PM Modi said on Ukraine war at BRICS Summit?

During his bilateral meeting with Russian president Vladimir Putin ahead of the BRICS Summit, Prime Minister Modi said India is ready to play whatever role to resolve the Ukraine conflict.

"I have been in constant touch with you on the subject of the ongoing conflict between Russia and Ukraine. As I have said earlier, we believe that the problems should be resolved in a peaceful manner. We fully support the early establishment of peace and stability. All our efforts give priority to humanity. India is ready to provide all possible cooperation in the times to come," the prime minister said in Russia's Kazan.
